

Rustic but upscale, cosmopolitan yet charming, historic and progressive, this magical country has something to offer every traveler.






BOOKS




Through over 100 recipes, American-born chef and restaurant owner, Jose Garces, takes the home cook


Floreana: A Woman's Pilgrimage to the Galápagos by Margaret Wittmer

Directed by Ecuadorian filmmaker, Tania Hermida, this film touches on themes of identity and difference as the two women re-evaluate the purpose of their journey across Ecuador.

My Time Will Come (2006)


A murder in Quito begins a series of intersecting tragedies that all find their way to the city morgue

MEJOR NO HABLAR

Mejor No Hablar (de Ciertas Cosas) (2012)

Drug-addicted brothers Paco and Luis lead careless lives full of illicit drugs and disenchantment. In need of money to feed their addiction, they decide to break into their parent's home to steal a porcelain horse. Caught in the act by their father, a violent fight ends in a tragedy that will haunt the brothers for the rest of their lives.


The Temple of the Sun

Ecuadorian artist Ortega Maila built this masterpiece as an ode to ancestral architecture and to house some of his most prominent indigenous paintings and sculptures. A cosmic site that often hosts dances, ceremonies, and more, take a self-guided tour through its halls or book an aromatherapy session and coca leaf tea courtesy of the museum.

Capilla del Hombre

This giant monument was built by artist Oswaldo Guayasamín, who dedicated it to the suffering of Latin America's indigenous poor and offered it as a symbol of hope for humankind. An art museum housing sculptures and murals specifically created for this space, the very atmosphere of the land on which it sits is integrated into the overarching theme of human violence and hope. Tours of 'La Capilla del Hombre' are available in English, French, or Spanish.

Oswaldo Guayasamín collected pre-Colombian pieces and colonial art objects throughout his life and, upon his death, his wish was that these artifacts would belong to the people of Ecuador. 
Olga Fisch

Olga Fisch was a Hungarian Jew and Bauhaus artist who first came to Ecuador in 1939 and was immediately mesmerized and inspired by the colors and textures of Ecuadorian folk culture. Not long after, she founded Olga Fisch: a line that aims to preserve Ecuadorian culture, heritage, and artisans and encompasses home décor, handbags, accessories, and clothing. Maquipucuna Reserve

Maquipucuna is more than your average ecotourism experience. Covering more than 14,000 acres in the Chocó Andino bioregion, it's a 34-year project to protect one of the world's top 5 biodiversity hotspots and the local communities that live there. This is a place for families, couples, adventurists, and wildlife enthusiasts to learn, play, and give back a little of what they received from their time in Ecuador.



Guayaquil is one of Ecuador's oldest and faster evolving cities. With upscale dining districts and trendy entertainment complexes built amongst historic charms and jungle-like gardens, this old port town is a tropical treasure trove with a character vastly different from the colonial cities you'll find in the country's interior.


Vento Rooftop



Museum of Anthropology and Contemporary Art (MAAC)

The structure of the Museum of Anthropology and Contemporary Art is intended to resemble a Huancavilca raft, the seagoing vessel of the last pre-Colombian culture along the Ecuadorian coast and whose many archaeological artifacts are housed within the Museum's walls. Intended to contribute to identity and cultural expression, those historical pieces sit side by side with almost 4,000 works by national and Latin American artists.




SOUVENIR SHOPS

Plaza Lagos



Bosque Protector Cerro Blanco

Before it was one of Ecuador's largest cosmopolitan centers, Guayaquil was virgin tropical dry forest. Cerro Blanco preserves 6,078 hectares of that heritage, including more than 700 species of vascular plants. The outdoor enthusiast will enjoy a day walking the 4 guided trails, bird watching in one of the 30 priority sites, or participating in an experimental visit to learn about the management of the area and its plants and native species.

Torre Morisca

The clock that sits atop the octagonal, Arab-Byzantine dome at 23 meters in height was first acquired in 1842. Though it's been moved throughout its history, the iconic tower has been sitting in its spot on the Malecon since 1931. Climb to the top to see the inner workings of the clock or stop for a photo-op of the unique structure while you stroll the Malecon.






Cuenca

Altitude: 2,560 m (8,399 ft)

Often called the most beautiful city in Ecuador, a short stroll around the city center will quickly demonstrate how Cuenca got its name. A recognized UNESCO World Heritage site, the city is known for textiles and crafts such as hats and shoes, impeccably preserved Renaissance cathedrals and churches, and a charm that permeates everything from their resto-bars to their markets.





RESTAURANTS

Tiesto's 🥖 🏉 🖉

In traditional Andean cooking, a "testo" is a clay plate used for preparing dry roasts of various staples. As an ode to their roots, Tiesto's structures all of their recipes to be prepared and served on these plates. But what we love most about this restaurant is the bar full of house-made chili peppers and sauces that enhance the flavors of each meat and seafood dish. Among our favorites are the eggplants in vinegar, the sweet pepper and pineapple, and the tree tomato pepper.








Lagunas de Cañada del Hoyo Natural Monument


Baños de Agua Santa
